FROM THE HMONG AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF COLORADO PRESIDENT

I am honored to share HMAAC’s 2025 Annual Report and reflect on a year shaped by reflection, responsibility, and renewal.

Over the past decade, HMAAC has experienced both challenges and growth. Like many community-based organizations, we have navigated periods where sustaining consistent involvement, leadership, and broad community engagement was difficult. At the same time, our community itself has continued to evolve—across generations, experiences, and needs. The organization HMAAC was when it was founded in 1992 is very different from the organization HMAAC is today.

In recognition of this evolution, and after 33 years of service to the Colorado Hmong community, the Board voted in 2025 to update HMAAC’s bylaws. These updates were made to better reflect who we are today, how we operate, and

what is required to support a growing, program-driven nonprofit organization. Most importantly, they position HMAAC for long-term stability, strong governance, and future success.

In addition, the Board formally adopted HMAAC’s 2025–2030 Strategic Plan, establishing a clear framework to guide priorities, decision-making, and growth over the next five years. Together, these milestones represent a renewed commitment to stewardship, accountability, and organizational health.

I want to sincerely thank our Board members, staff, volunteers, donors, and community partners for their dedication and belief in HMAAC. Your continued support is helping shape a stronger, more connected future for our community.

It is a privilege to serve the Colorado Hmong community, and I look forward to what we will continue to build together.

2025 PROGRAMS & SERVICES

HMAAC's programs and services are designed to preserve Hmong culture, strengthen community connection, and support the well-being and leadership of Hmong people across Colorado. Guided by community voice and cultural values, our work centers on creating accessible, welcoming spaces where individuals of all ages can learn, grow, and feel a sense of belonging.

Through culturally rooted education, youth and leadership development, language and cultural preservation, and community support services, HMAAC responds to both long-standing and emerging needs within the community. Together, these programs reflect our commitment to honoring Hmong identity while building pathways for individuals, families, and future generations to thrive.

PROGRAMS

HMONG LANGUAGE & CULTURE (HLC)

The Hmong Language & Culture Program is a cornerstone of HMAAC's mission to preserve the rich linguistic and cultural heritage of the Hmong people. Through intergenerational learning and community-centered instruction, the program plays a vital role in ensuring Hmong language and culture are passed on to future generations. The program equips individuals with essential skills in speaking, reading, and writing Hmong as well as educating them on the cultural traditions and practices. By fostering a sense of pride and connection to their roots, the program empowers participants to communicate effectively and connect with others within the community and beyond.



HMONG DANCE ACADEMY (HDA)

The HMAAC Dance Academy provides an engaging platform for youth and young adults to immerse themselves in traditional and modern Hmong dance. This program not only teaches a variety of dance styles but also serves as a bridge to connect younger generations with their cultural heritage. Through dance, participants build confidence, form lasting friendships, and deepen their connection to the community. The program encourages boys and girls to embrace their cultural roots while developing skills that will enrich their personal and social lives.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP - HMONG STUDENTS OF COLORADO (HSC)

In 2025, HMAAC launched its first-ever Youth Leadership Program to inspire and empower high school and college-level students to become future leaders. This program provides leadership workshops, mentorship opportunities, and hands-on community projects, fostering essential skills like communication, teamwork, and cultural pride. Participants have the opportunity to engage with experienced mentors, explore Hmong traditions, and implement initiatives addressing community challenges.



HMONG COLORADO WOMEN (HCW)

In 2025, HMAAC launched the Hmong Colorado Women (HCW) pilot program, a dedicated initiative created to uplift, empower, and unite Hmong women across Colorado. It serves as a vital, safe space for connection, support, celebration, and shared learning to build a strong sisterhood for all women in the community. HCW fills a long-standing need for a vibrant network where women can share experiences and offer practical and emotional support to one another. Based on the program's impact and strong community response, HMAAC is committed to sustaining Hmong Colorado Women as a permanent program beginning in 2026.



SERVICES

TRANSLATION & INTERPRETATION

HMAAC offers professional Hmong translation and interpretation services to ensure that documents, conversations, and communications are clear and accurate, reliably bridging language barriers for effective understanding.

CITIZENSHIP TEST PREPARATION

HMAAC offers culturally-rooted U.S. Citizenship Test Preparation designed to help Hmong community members, especially older adults, confidently navigate the N-400 application, civics exam, and interview process.



HONORING CULTURE, STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY



2025 SPECIAL EVENTS

HMAAC's special events are designed to celebrate Hmong culture, honor community milestones, and strengthen connections across Colorado. Guided by cultural values and community voice, these events create welcoming spaces where individuals and families of all ages can come together to learn, share, and feel a sense of belonging.

From large-scale cultural celebrations to educational gatherings and community-centered activities, HMAAC's events provide opportunities to engage with heritage, connect across generations, and uplift the voices and stories of the Hmong community. Together, these events reflect our commitment to preserving Hmong identity while fostering joy, connection, and resilience throughout the community.



ANNUAL EVENTS

HMAAC INAUGURAL GRAND GALA BALL

On March 22, 2025, HMAAC hosted its first-ever Grand Gala Ball—an elegant evening celebrating culture, community, and connection. The event brought together supporters and partners to honor HMAAC's 32-year legacy while investing in the future of the organization. The inaugural gala showcased HMAAC's lasting impact through cultural performances, a curated three-course dinner, a silent auction, and meaningful opportunities for connection. The evening raised vital funds to support programs that preserve Hmong culture, uplift youth and families, and strengthen community well-being. A highlight of the night was a once-in-a-lifetime concert by legendary Hmong artist Luj Yaj, making the event truly unforgettable.



MILE HIGH HMONG SUMMER FESTIVAL

The Summer Festival, held annually in June, is a family-friendly community gathering that brings Hmong families together for a weekend of connection, fun, and outdoor engagement, welcoming more than 1,000 attendees each year. A central feature of the festival is its sports tournaments, including volleyball, flag football, cornhole, soccer, and tuj lub (traditional Hmong top spinning). In addition to sports, the festival offers craft vendors, a variety of food options, and interactive activities for all ages. Designed to encourage families to get outdoors, stay active, and spend quality time together, the Summer Festival creates a welcoming, community-centered space that strengthens relationships and promotes healthy, active lifestyles.



COLORADO HMONG NEW YEAR

The Colorado Hmong New Year is HMAAC's flagship that brings the Hmong community and friends together to celebrate Hmong culture and heritage. Each year, over 3,000 attendees gather during the weekend after Thanksgiving to celebrate the Hmong New Year. Featuring live entertainment, traditional music and dance, vibrant cultural attire, and a variety of vendors offering crafts and authentic Hmong cuisine, this annual event is a cornerstone of community pride. COHNY is more than just a celebration—it is a platform for cultural exchange, unity, and the preservation of rich traditions passed down through generations.



HMAAC TOWN HALL MEETINGS

HMAAC Town Hall Meetings are held twice each year to create open and inclusive spaces for dialogue between HMAAC leadership and the Colorado Hmong community. These forums allow community members to learn about organizational updates, programs, and upcoming initiatives, while also sharing feedback, ideas, and concerns. By centering community voice and encouraging two-way communication, Town Halls help ensure that HMAAC's work remains transparent, responsive, and grounded in community needs.



HCW HMONG HOLIDAY ARTS, CRAFTS & MORE SHOW

On December 13, 2025, HMAAC hosted its first-ever Hmong Holiday Arts, Crafts & More Show—a community-centered marketplace celebrating Hmong creativity, artistry, and entrepreneurship. Organized by Hmong Colorado Women, the event featured Hmong artists, crafters, and small business owners showcasing handmade goods, traditional crafts, artwork, and culturally inspired products. The event also included cultural performances and festive activities, including opportunities for children to meet Santa. The show created a welcoming space for community members to support local vendors, connect with one another, and celebrate Hmong culture during the holiday season.

2025 COLORADO HMONG NEW YEAR

42nd ANNUAL CELEBRATION

The 2025 Colorado Hmong New Year Celebration, held on November 29–30, marked a historic milestone—50 years of Hmong legacy in the United States—honoring the strength, resilience, and enduring spirit of the Hmong people. This year's gathering held deep significance as community members came together to reflect on a powerful history while celebrating cultural continuity, collective healing, and new beginnings. The celebration welcomed over 3,000 attendees, making it one of the largest Hmong cultural gatherings in Colorado.

Originating from the mountainous regions of Southeast Asia, the Hmong people played a critical role during the Vietnam War as Special Guerrilla Units (SGUs) who fought alongside the U.S. CIA in the Secret War in Laos. Hmong women also served courageously as nurses, caretakers, and essential providers, tending to the wounded and sustaining families under extraordinary circumstances. In the aftermath of the war, many Hmong families faced persecution and displacement, forcing them to flee their homeland in search of safety and opportunity. Thousands eventually resettled in the United States, bringing with them rich traditions, cultural knowledge, and an unwavering commitment to family and community.

The Colorado Hmong New Year stood as a vibrant testament to that journey. Now in its 42nd year, the celebration continued to serve as one of the largest cultural gatherings for the Hmong community in Colorado, providing a space for cultural expression, intergenerational connection, and community pride. Attendees experienced traditional music and dance, colorful handmade attire, cultural performances, ceremonial practices, and diverse Hmong cuisine—each element reflecting the beauty and depth of Hmong heritage.

Beyond festivity, the Hmong New Year remained a time of gratitude, reflection, and renewal. The event offered space to honor ancestors, acknowledge the struggles that shaped the community, and reaffirm hopes for the future. For youth and younger generations, the celebration provided opportunities to learn their history, strengthen cultural identity, and build pride in their roots. For the broader Colorado community, it served as an open invitation to learn, celebrate, and stand in solidarity with the Hmong people.

As we commemorated 50 years of Hmong presence in the United States and celebrated the 42nd Annual Colorado Hmong New Year, we honored a legacy built on courage, sacrifice, and resilience. Together, we celebrated the past, uplifted the present, and looked forward to a future rooted in cultural strength, unity, and possibility.

2025 – 2030 STRATEGIC PLAN

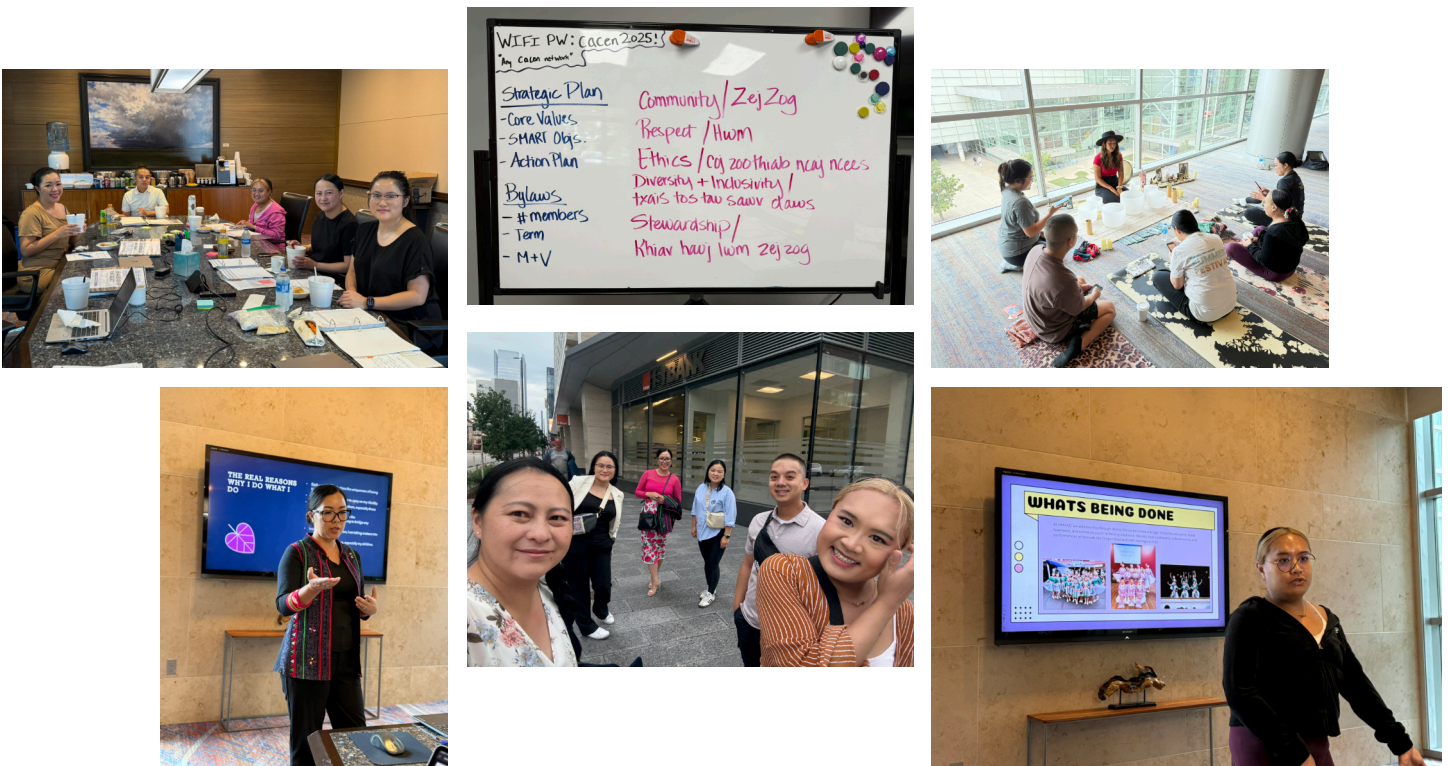
A ROADMAP FOR GROWTH & COMMUNITY IMPACT

HMAAC's 2025–2030 Strategic Plan marks the organization's first-ever formal strategic plan and represents a significant milestone in our evolution. Since HMAAC's founding in 1992, the needs, strengths, and aspirations of the Hmong community—and the organization itself—have grown and changed in profound ways. Today, HMAAC operates in a more complex environment with expanded programs, partnerships, and responsibilities, making intentional and thoughtful planning more important than ever.

The development of this plan was a community-informed and board-guided process. In late 2024, HMAAC's Board of Directors approved the launch of a strategic planning effort, beginning with a community survey conducted at the 2024 Colorado Hmong New Year. Throughout 2025, staff and board members reviewed community feedback, assessed organizational strengths and challenges, and outlined priority areas for growth. HMAAC also engaged a consultant to support and facilitate the planning process, including a strategic planning retreat held in August 2025. Following this retreat, the plan was refined and finalized, and formally adopted by the Board of Directors in September 2025.

In conjunction with the development of the strategic plan, HMAAC undertook a major organizational milestone by revising its bylaws to better reflect the organization as it exists today and to support its future direction. This effort ensured alignment between governance structure and strategic priorities. The updated bylaws were formally adopted by the Board of Directors in October 2025.

Together, this strategic plan and updated governance framework serve as a clear roadmap for strengthening organizational capacity, deepening community impact, and advancing equity for Hmong and Southeast Asian communities across Colorado. Grounded in community voice, cultural values, and lived experience, the plan articulates our shared vision for growth, sustainability, and long-term change over the next five years.



STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES



GOVERNANCE

By the start of FY 2026, update and adopt HMAAC's bylaws, develop comprehensive board-level operating policies, fill remaining Board of Directors seats and determine need Directors & Officers Insurance to ensure compliance, accountability, and effective governance.



FUND DEVELOPMENT

Develop a comprehensive 5-year Fund Development Plan, including a 5-year financial projection, to guide fundraising efforts and support HMAAC's pursuit of long-term financial sustainability.



ORGANIZATIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE

By the end of FY 2026, strengthen HMAAC's organizational infrastructure by building staffing capacity, establishing key administrative and financial systems, and investing in tools and resources that enable the organization to effectively deliver and sustain its programs and services.



COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY

Create and implement a comprehensive communications strategy that includes marketing, advertising, and public relations to effectively tell HMAAC's story—past, present, and future—highlight programs, and demonstrate organizational impact.



PROGRAM STRENGTH, IMPACT & SUSTAINABILITY

Enhance program effectiveness and long-term sustainability by evaluating current programs, refining program offerings, and implementing strategies to increase community participation, outcomes, and overall impact.



EVENTS OPTIMIZATION

Refine HMAAC's events to better meet the needs of the Hmong community in Colorado and beyond, while ensuring that events remain financially sustainable and contribute positively to HMAAC's cash flow.

2025 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Building Financial Strength & Sustainability

In 2025, HMAAC continued to strengthen its financial foundation while investing in programs, events, and organizational operations that advance our mission. Total operating revenue for the year was **\$341,271**, generated through a diverse mix of grants, individual donations, and community events—placing HMAAC within the range of most small, community-based nonprofit organizations nationwide. Operating expenses totaled **\$186,546**, reflecting HMAAC’s commitment to directing resources toward culturally rooted programs, community celebrations, and staffing capacity, while maintaining responsible administrative and operational costs. The difference between revenue and expenses reflects a positive operating margin, demonstrating solid financial health and positioning HMAAC to build reserves, invest in organizational infrastructure, and pursue long-term sustainability.

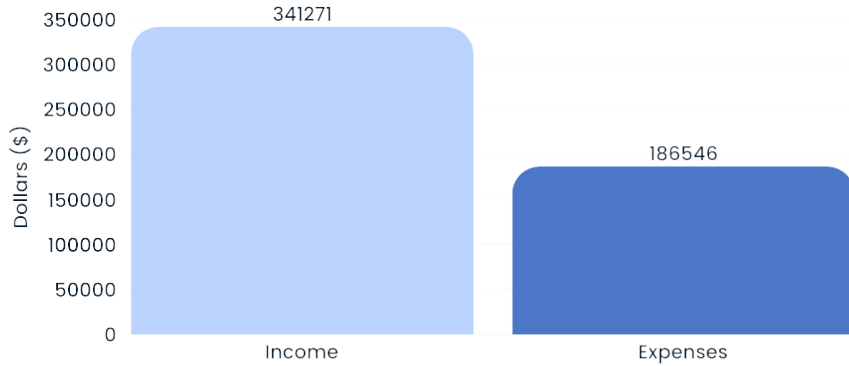

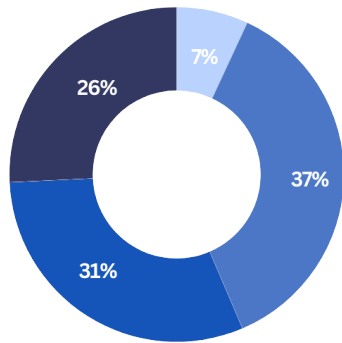
Income & Expenses



OPERATING REVENUES & GAINS

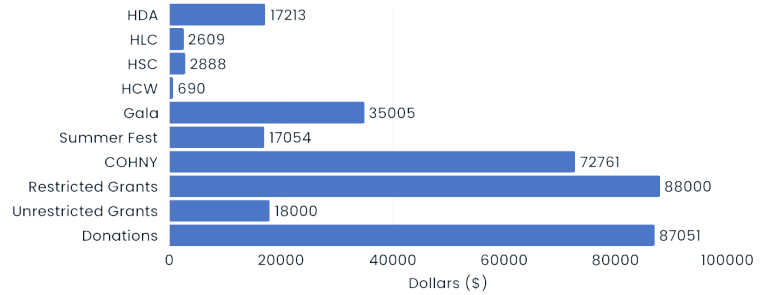
Income Categories

OPERATING REVENUES & GAINS

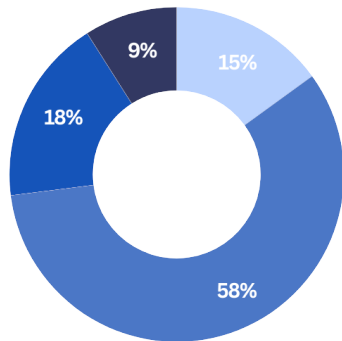
Income by Activity



OPERATING EXPENSES

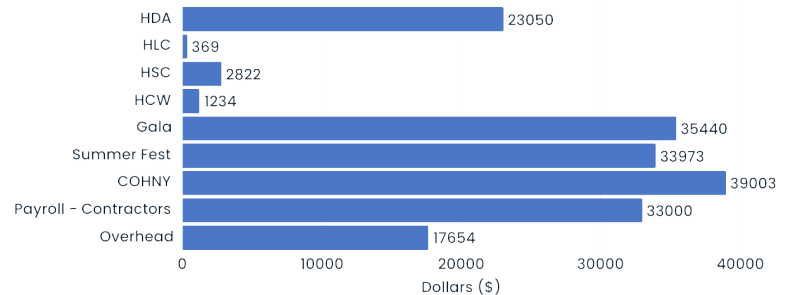
Expense Categories
